The Verde River Watershed A Significant National Resource

Yes! We are relevant and will continue to be so as long as stewardship, preservation, quality of life and caring for our community are important to our daily lives and future generations.

Since 2005, Keep Sedona Beautiful (KSB) has been a charter member of the Verde River Basin Partnership (Partnership). We have been working in a collaborative effort to develop recognition, within the Verde River Watershed which includes Oak Creek and the Greater Sedona Area, that our water resources are at risk. Additionally, we have been highlighting the importance of the watershed as a national asset and a state treasure. This article will highlight the need to preserve this important resource.

The Partnership is dedicated to the preservation of the surface water and groundwater of the Verde River Watershed (Watershed) and is launching a series of articles to promote and inform citizens of our valued natural resources within the Watershed. The Verde River, located in Central Arizona. is the master drainage of the 5,661-square-mile Watershed that extends from Seligman on the north to just north of Mesa, Arizona, where it empties into the Salt River. Its watershed encompasses communities in the Prescott and Verde Valley/Sedona area. The Watershed's surface waters represent some of the few remaining perennial streams in Arizona. The Verde River runs nearly freely from its source springs near Paulden for approximately 137 miles before reaching

Horseshoe Reservoir north of Phoenix.

The groundwater and surface waters of the Watershed are virtually the sole source of water to all the residents, animals, plant species and aquatic creatures living within the watershed. Further, they are a critical source of water for those residents and businesses in the Phoenix metropolitan area that are supplied by the Salt River Project which receives up to 40 percent of its water from our Watershed. Thus water from our Watershed is the lifeblood of millions of Arizona residents and is crucial to our region and Arizona's economic viability.

The Watershed is an asset of the American people. More than two-thirds is managed by federal agencies. Federal lands include parts of the Prescott, Kaibab, Coconino and Tonto National Forests. Within these forests are eight federally designated wilderness areas, that help provide habitat for 270 species of birds, 94 species of mammals and 76 species of native amphibians and reptiles. As reliant as humans are on water, so are these species.

Recognizing the uniqueness of the Verde River south of Camp Verde and of Fossil Creek, Congress has designated these waters as Wild

KSB and Sedona Recycles, Inc. Analyze Sedona's Roadside Trash

In late July, 2012, Keep Sedona Beautiful, Inc. (KSB) joined Sedona Recycles, Inc. (SRI) in a special project to analyze roadside litter gathered by KSB Litter Lifters earlier that month. KSB and SRI hoped that identification of items carelessly discarded along our roads might lead to preventative solutions.

KSB's Litter Lifters removed twenty six bags and assorted junk from 12 miles of area roads during that period. SRI's Executive Director, Jill McCutcheon and Alex Rovang, Director of Community Outreach, courageously donned gloves and dove-in, as did KSB volunteers Bill Pumphrey, Suzie Dunn, Wendy Heald and James Bishop, Jr., who, significantly, is a board member for both organizations. SRI's Rovang estimated that nearly 75% of the litter is recyclable. The group's sorting efforts revealed that the recycled materials consisted primarily of plastic bottles, aluminum cans, cardboard and plastic bags from various sources.

Extrapolating from the litter sampling, Bill Pumphrey, Litter Lifter Chairperson, estimates that its dedicated corps of Litter Lifters collects on average two 32-gallon bags per month per mile, or 130 bags for



the 65 adopted miles or 4,160 gallons of litter per month on Sedona highways! Imagine if folks would recycle their waste instead of littering – that would be 3,120 gallons of material kept out of our landfills each month, worth thousands of dollars! Luckily for us ... there's no need to imagine! Free and convenient recycling opportunities abound throughout the Verde Valley, thanks to the efforts of Sedona Recycles, Inc., a local nonprofit organization that has "been keeping the Red Rocks greens" since 1989". KSB president Tom O'Halleran stated "We encourage our members and the public at large to add value to our beautiful community by picking up litter and supporting Sedona Recycles, Inc. with the proper disposal of plastic bottles, and other recyclable materials. and Scenic Rivers. Fossil Creek, a channel of emerald-green water set in travertine, is a riparian paradise in an arid upland desert area. The State of Arizona has designated Oak Creek a Unique Arizona Waterway. Most of the surface waters within the watershed are also critical habitat for federally listed endangered and threatened species.

Humans play an essential role in the preservation of the groundwater and surface water within the watershed. Future articles will highlight the critical interconnection between our groundwater and surface water systems while identifying how ground water pumping affects the viability of our surface waters, riparian habitat, wildlife, quality of life, and economy.

Throughout our nation, citizens have come to realize that the sustainability of our natural resources is dependent on our understanding the water resources and working together in a collaborative effort to plan for their conservation and preservation. The Watershed's rivers, creeks and springs are an indicator of the health of our water supply.
