PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE:

National Park Service Celebrates its Centennial

This year, 2016, the National Park Service (NPS) celebrates its centennial (100th) anniversary of its founding in 1916.

The centennial will be celebrated across the nation and in the 400+ parks and historical sites maintained by the U.S. government.

It is all too easy in our world today to assume things were always thus, but the movement to set aside and preserve our rich and diverse natural, scenic beauty had actually begun years before the founding of the NPS, when in the mid-1800s a small group of advocates had a vision—what writer Wallace Stegner has called "the best idea we ever had"—to ensure that America's greatest natural treasures would belong to everyone and remain preserved forever. (Quote from the National Geographic Travel website).

Naturalist John Muir, among others, brought the magnificence of said lands to those who had never seen them. His prolific writings manifested how these beautiful and scenic wild places were important for the soul. His advocacy later led to the creation of several national parks.

Responding to such calls, Congress and President Abraham Lincoln put Yosemite under the protection of the State of California during the Civil War. In 1872 Lincoln's former general, President Ulysses S. Grant, and the US Congress, established our first National Park (Yellowstone) in the then territories of Montana and Wyoming.

It was however during the administration of President Teddy Roosevelt that preservation and conservation public lands really exploded. President Roosevelt was one of the park system's greatest patrons. His conservation legacy is found in the more than 230 million acres of public lands he helped establish during his presidency. During his administration (1901-09) five new national parks were created, as well as 18 national monuments, four national game refuges, 51 bird sanctuaries, and over 100 million acres of national forest. And they were both active in the Pushmataha gardens, with a particular interest in native plants and prevention/removal of invasive species.



KSB Plans to Expand Litter Lifters Program

Pending approval of a grant application submitted to the City of Sedona, Keep Sedona Beautiful (KSB) plans to add Sedona residential streets to our already incredible Litter Lifters Program. Now covering over 68 miles of highways and major roads in the area, this new initiative will enlist residents to "adopt" residential streets to keep them clear of unwanted litter. The plan is an effort to build community pride and foster volunteerism while making Sedona one of the cleanest communities anywhere.

As an important companion to this expanded Litter Lifter program, increased residential recycling will also be promoted. We know that recycling and reuse means less litter in our world, but sadly, we continue to see plastic bags in trees and bushes, as well as water bottles and other plastics along the highway, all of which could be recycled.

Watch for sign-up instructions for the new Sedona Clean effort. In the meantime, KSB does need new Litter Lifters. Try it out by serving as a temporary Litter Lifter covering for others who are out of town. For details call Litter Lifter HQ, 928-282-4938.

Noise Abatement Continues to Make Progress

The KSB Noise Abatement Committee, in conjunction with the City of Sedona's Citizen's Engagement Group, continues to work on the issues of airport noise and helicopter tours. On May 5, Mike Yarbrough met with Amanda Shankland, the new airport manager, to discuss available remedies to improve the situation with helicopter tours. Options discussed included citizen representation on the airport board, adequate insurance, flight tracking technologies in all tour craft, curfews and other available steps.

On May 10, Yarbrough appeared with Justin Clifton, Sedona City Manager, before the Sedona City Council to brief them on the status of the Citizen Engagement Group efforts. City Council was receptive to working with the airport to explore means to improve the noise and frequency of helicopter tours. The Council asked Justin Clifton to be the point person for additional discussions.

Justin and Mike met with the airport manager in June to continue discussions. In addition, meetings have been scheduled with the city attorney and the county attorney to update them on legal avenues and caselaw. A meeting was also held at the Forest Service with Nicole Branton, Red Rock District Ranger, to update the Forest Service on recent activities and to solicit its support for changes.

Finally various Home Owners Associations have been meeting to discuss avenues for contacting elected officials to have them take steps to curtail tour operations. Work will continue in the coming months.

the sustainability of those resources, The National Park System today preventing their destruction as a result comprises more than 400 areas of commercial interests. (National Capital Parks, National

Following Roosevelt's visionary work, it soon became evident that some organization was required to ensure a methodical and standardized approach to the care and preservation of said national treasures. Thus, on August 25, 1916, President Woodrow Wilson signed the act creating the National Park Service, a new federal bureau in the Department of the Interior, to "protect the wild and wonderful landscapes" in the United States. The NPS became responsible for protecting the 35 national parks and monuments then managed by the department, as well as those yet to be established.

(National Capital Parks, National Memorials, National Military Parks, National Cemeteries, National Monuments, National Parkways, National Seashores. National Lakeshores, and National Heritage Areas) covering more than 84 million acres in 50 states, the District of Columbia, American Samoa, Guam, Puerto Rico, Saipan, and the Virgin Islands.

National Parks are woven into the fabric of American life for so many generations that it's hard to imagine our nation without them. While the United States was the first country in the world to set aside land for everyone to enjoy, and to retain in its natural

state, more than 100 other countries have adopted similar practices of land preservation through the creation of national parks or similarly reserved lands.

As President of KSB, I, too, believe that we must follow in the footsteps of our visionary forefathers, ever vigilant, and working continuously as stewards to preserve these magnificent treasures of natural scenic beauty for future generations. President Roosevelt's quote below has even greater relevance to us today as stewards of our own unique Red Rock Country.


SAVE THE DATES

Dark-Sky News

According to Arizona State University, Center for Meteorite Studies, a bright fireball was witnessed by several Valley of the Sun residents in the early morning hours of June 2, 2016. Reports describe a bright flash of light around 4 a.m., and some were awakened by a loud bang.

According to Center Meteorite Curator Laurence Garvie, this could be a single meteor burning up as it entered the Earth's atmosphere, and radar footage shows that meteorites may have fallen to the ground early Thursday morning near the eastern Arizona community of Cibecue.

The definition of a Meteor: A trail of light produced by a meteoroid as it passes through an atmosphere. And the definition of a Meteorite is a meteoroid that was naturally transported from the celestial body on which it formed to a region beyond that body's gravitational field, and that later collided with the surface of a celestial body larger than itself, such as Earth. (Rubin & Grossman, 2010.)

In May the International Dark-Sky Association (IDA) announced Flagstaff Area National Monuments – Sunset Crater Volcano, Walnut Canyon and Wupatki – have been designated as an International Dark Sky Park by the IDA. The monuments and their immediate environs produce little light pollution of their own, with minimal amounts from Walnut Canyon and Sunset Crater Volcano and almost no light pollution at Wupatki. The monuments are near Flagstaff. In June, the IDA and the National Park Service announced that Grand Canyon National Park is now an IDA International Dark-Sky Park. Scott Feierabend, IDA Executive Director, stated that designating Grand Canyon National Park an International Dark-Sky Park is an important step in ensuring the Colorado Plateau remains a protective harbor for some of the best night skies in the county.

Arizona has four International Dark-Sky Communities and four International Dark-Sky Parks. Please see the list below.

 - 3. Flagstaff Area National Monuments, silver tier, 2016, which include:
 - a. Sunset Crater Volcano National Monument
 - b. Walnut Canyon National Monument
 - c. Wupatki National Monument
 - 4. Grand Canyon National Park, Provisional, 2016 (provisional status gives park officials 3 years to retrofit 2/3 of the lights to meet strict IDA standards)
- ii. International Dark-Sky Communities in Arizona
 - 1. Flagstaff, 2001
 - 2. Sedona, 2014
 - 3. Thunder Mountain Pootsee Nightsky, 2015
 - 4. Big Park/Village of Oak Creek, 2016




