A Sedona Legend (1927-2018) by Bill Pumphrey

If you have lived in the Sedona area during the last 30 years, you probably came across Jim Eaton at a community or city meeting. Jim was hard to miss, towering at six feet five inches in his trademark suspenders. Maybe you read his KSB column in the Red Rock News, participated in a Sedona Forum, visited the Sedona Historical Museum or were a KSB member. He was ultimately dedicated to our community.

Jim often said his volunteer work "keeps my blood moving".

He was committed to Sedona since his retirement and arrival here in 1986. His life here ranged from fostering the newly incorporated City in 1988, through his various governance roles, to keeping preservation and conservation forefront via Keep Sedona Beautiful. Other than KSB, his friends and family say Jim was proudest of the Historical Commission, and creation of the Sedona Historical Society. Interestingly, Jim was KSB President in the mid 90's just after KSB occupied the Pushmataha Center, the property and building received through Ms. Susan Coleman's will. Years later, the center was granted recognition as a Sedona Historical Landmark No. 15.

He enjoyed other things as well. He particularly favored river cruising worldwide, and woodworking. He beautifully handcrafted nearly all of the furniture in his Sedona home, sizing pieces to fit his large stature.

I met Jim in 2001, during the Sedona Academy Forum of that year, where, as an Academy principal, he was leading citizen groups developing solutions for community growth and tourism challenges. Later, I worked with Jim on several KSB Awards of Excellence Programs.

Recalling one particular case, I welcomed his help organizing the new annual Humane Society of Sedona fund raising auctions. A master at event organizing, and using his high-level computer skills, he upgraded our auction event significantly. I chuckle to myself when I recall Jim wildly suggesting a special video of HSS adopted cats and dogs showing on big screens during the preauction walk-in segment at the Elks Club. The pet owners kindly donated money to support their pet's on-screen tribute. Jim also insisted on advertising current adoptable animals in the video. Unexpectedly, Jim's effort raised an additional \$1,000.

An icon of Sedona has departed. Jim Eaton certainly left his mark across our community, the region, and not least, at Keep Sedona Beautiful.





We in the Verde Valley are rightly proud that both Sedona and the Village of Oak Creek have earned Dark-Sky Community designation from the International Dark-Sky Association (IDA). 16 communities have earned this distinction, mostly in the US, but also in Canada, Scotland, Denmark and the Chanel Islands.

But did you know that the IDA also certifies parks, reserves and sanctuaries? In total, there are 12 reserves, 55 parks and 3 sanctuaries that have been certified by the IDA.

While all of the previously certified reserves are overseas, the US just added its first, the Central Idaho Dark-Sky Reserves, 1,416 square

miles of remote lands in the Sawtooth Mountains of central Idaho. Like much of the Verde Valley, the Sawtooth National Recreation Area is managed by the U.S. Forest Service. One of the mandates of the Forest Service is to preserve natural and scenic qualities. Retaining and enhancing dark skies helps them fulfill this important part of their mission.

If you experience a sense of awe and wonder as you enjoy our dark skies, make a point of learning about all of the spectacular places around the world where dark skies are protected. You can learn about them by visiting the <u>IDA website</u>. Happy dark sky travels!

CHwards of Œxcellence

n January 31, 2018 we presented our Awards of Excellence, recognizing two businesses and two local couples whose activities have contributed significantly to our community.

Executive Vice President Joanne Kendrick kicked off the event by recapping our 2017 accomplishments, including lifting litter on 70 miles of Sedona roads, promoting our dark skies, sponsoring the Native Plant Workshop and our Speaker Series, and working on noise abatement issues.

KSB President Mike Yarbrough then paused to honor Jim Eaton who passed away recently. Jim was a past president of KSB, a board member, a recipient of numerous awards, a very active community leader, and a friend and mentor. He will be greatly missed.

In honor of 45 years of service to the community, Sedona Mayor Sandy Moriarty then announced a proclamation declaring January 31, 2018 as Keep Sedona Beautiful Day. KSB is deeply honored by this recognition.

Among the attendees were a number of additional local dignitaries, including Sedona Chief of Police David McGill, Sedona City Council members Scott Jablow, Tom Lamkin, and Jon Thompson, Yavapai County Supervisor Randy Garrison, Coconino County Supervisor Matt Ryan, and Chamber of Commerce CEO Jennifer Wesselhoff.

Although Congressman Tom O'Halleran could not attend, he recorded a brief video that was played for attendees. As a past KSB president himself, Rep. O'Halleran spoke of its many accomplishments. In particular, he noted the organizations efforts to "protect our public lands and preserve the natural beauty of our country."

Awards of Excellence were then bestowed, with each awardee being presented a commemorative photo supplied by local photographer Susie Reed.

Mike Yarbrough presented CVS Pharmacy Sedona an award for excellence in dark sky lighting, noting that "CVS's outdoor lighting is a model of how lighting can be dark-sky friendly. CVS is an excellent example of dark-sky compliant lighting using light only where and when it is needed." The award was presented to CVS Pharmacy Manager Julie Frame and CVS Store Manager Rosemary Ramirez.

Mike then presented an award for architecture and design to the Courtyard by Marriott Sedona. Accepting the award were Bill

Tonnesen, landscape architect and contractor for the project, along with Margaret Radford and Yvonne Estrada representing the Sunridge Hotel Group, the owner and developer of the property. Yarbrough explained that "local native plants were used exclusively and planted attractively among the red rocks surrounding the building and parking lot. The seed bank, leaf litter, and indigenous aggregate was salvaged and used as an alternative to traditional decomposed granite ground cover."

Two local couples were then honored. First, Darcy Hitchcock and Dale Graham received an award for environmental stewardship. Mike commented that "since moving to Sedona, Darcy and Dale have been speaking out effectively and passionately about sustainability in our community. This award demonstrates that in their own lives Darcy and Dale put into practice the principles they have been promoting, building a home that is a model for sustainable building practices."

Don and Jan Groves received the final award, for excellence in Community Service. The Groves have been instrumental in revitalizing the Big Park Community School, spearheading the effort to pursue certification as an International Baccalaureate program. Mike noted, "not only was the involvement of the Groves focused on the substance of this program but they also became spokespersons to businesses and the community to raise funds for this endeavor. They have raised funds for teacher training as well as annual fees for the International Baccalaureate Program."

What should our sustainability priorities be? By Darcy Hitchcock, co-founder of the Sustainability Alliance

In November, 2017, the Sustainability Alliance conducted a survey of our organizations' members to see what they felt the sustainability priorities should be in Northern Arizona/Verde Valley. This was not a public survey. We wanted input from people who are knowledgeable about aspects of sustainability.

We based the primary question on internationally agreed-upon Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), a framework used around the world to measure progress toward a sustainable society. But depending where you live, some goals are more relevant than others. We hoped this survey would help us understand what priorities might best be pursued in this region. The results can indicate to our elected officials and non-profits what some of our members think should be goals to pursue as well as whether they are satisfied with current efforts or think more should be done.

While the poll is still open, there were 46 respondents at the time this article was written. Please note, this was not a scientific survey and the sample size small, so the results should be used only to inform, not to make decisions. That said, there were some intriguing findings. This article summarizes what we learned.

Are we doing enough?


We started by asking whether the respondents felt we were doing enough. The question posed: "To what degree do you think the Verde Valley/Northern AZ should be pursuing sustainable practices (e.g. recycling, living wage jobs, renewable energy, water conservation)?" The vast majority of the respondents, over 90 percent, said "We should be doing quite a bit more."

What should our priorities be?

The main question in the survey asked respondents to choose up to five of the SDGs that we should set as local goals and then pursue. The SDGs are goals that are agreed to by virtually all nations, both developed and developing. The issues and actions, however, tend to differ based on where you are. For example, "clean water and sanitation" in the developing world involves setting up toilets; in this region, it's largely an issue of outstripping water resources with

use and development.

The following chart organizes the SDGs into categories: Economic, Social, and Environmental. Of course, all these goals are interconnected (e.g., an economic goal can have direct impacts on the other categories).



Overall, social and environmental issues averaged somewhat higher votes than did the economic area.

Regarding social issues in the community, quality education, sustainable communities and good health/well-being topped the list.

Since hunger, poverty and decent work show up on the chart as economic but are also social issues, you can infer that these interconnected issues are seen by the respondents as the next tier to address, along with reducing inequalities/homelessness.

For the environment, climate action and clean energy, two

interconnected goals, topped the list. We should assess our climate-related risks (most likely worse droughts, fires, and floods) and plan for them. We could also be doing more to encourage the expansion of renewable energy and alternative transportation. Current efforts to reduce food waste also play an important role.

On the economic front, responsible production and consumption got the most votes by far. We could start with more convenient recycling and composting. We could also encourage entrepreneurs to come up with products they could make from our waste streams.

What needs to happen now?

Like many studies or surveys, this poll raises as many questions as it answers. More work needs to be done to refine the priorities. This survey is only a partial snapshot. Some of these goals can be nested into a hierarchy so respondents might have factored those relationships into their answers. For example, renewable energy is a part of climate action, so voting for climate action might have been intended as a vote for both. It would be helpful to follow up this survey with focus groups or interviews to understand the thinking behind the choices.


